

Tips on Applying to Graduate School

Tips on writing a personal statement

Additional tips:

- ◆ Make sure your personal statement is a “polished piece” of writing. Very often it is the only example of your writing abilities provided to the selection committee.
- ◆ Treat everyone with whom you come in contact in a professional manner. Very often professors serve as Graduate Advisors.
- ◆ Follow up on your application with each institution to make sure it is complete.
- ◆ Keep all materials related to each school in its own folder. Place or staple a check sheet in the front of each folder. Keep a contact log, noting the date and name of each person you speak to or email, as well as what it was regarding. Retain photocopies of materials you have sent to each institution.
- ◆ Type whenever possible, otherwise print carefully. Neatness and accuracy count!
